Message from General Pervez Musharraf President of The Islamic Republic of Pakistan on the occasion of 60th Independence Day, August 14, 2006



I am privileged to greet my Pakistani brothers and sisters both at home and overseas on the auspicious occasion of our 60th Independence Day.

The flag hoisting was followed by an investiture ceremony. High Commissioner HE Dr Maleeha Lodhi on behalf of the President of Pakistan conferred on the UK Department for International Development team and Air Vice Marshal A G Walton (RAF), NATO forces commander the awards of Sitara-i-Eisaar (Star of Sacrifice).

Gareth Thomas, International Development Minister received the award on behalf of the DFID team in recognition of the vital role played by the team in relief and rescue cooperation with UN agencies, Pakistan Army and government departments saving precious lives after the October 2005 earthquake in Azad Kashmir and NWFP.

Air Vice Marshal A. G. Walton (RAF) was commended for his meritorious services for the cause of humanity. His enlightened guidance to his troops to ensure immediate provision of relief along with timely completion of assigned tasks and generated lot of goodwill for his forces in the affected area of Azad Kashmir and NWFP.

Earthquake update...



UNHCR phases out of Pakistan's quake zone

This is a summary of what was said by UNHCR spokesperson Ron Redmond at the press briefing, on 1 September 2006, at the Palais des Nations in Geneva.

UNHCR yesterday closed its offices in Pakistan's earthquake-affected areas and handed over full responsibility for the management of relief camps to the local authorities. From now until the end of the year, we will be advising the authorities through the UN Resident Coordinator's office and our partner, the Norwegian Refugee Council (NRC).

With a mandate to help refugees fleeing war and persecution, UNHCR does not normally get involved in natural disasters. But we had to help after 2004's tsunami and last October's earthquake, given the sheer scale of the disasters and our existing presence in Sri Lanka and Pakistan. From the start, our involvement in this relief effort was time-limited – until the end of the winter, and then we would phase out by 1 September 2006.

Immediately after the earthquake, UNHCR opened its warehouses in Pakistan and distributed relief items to the quake survivors. We also mobilized thousands of tonnes of emergency supplies from our stockpiles in Afghanistan, Denmark, Dubai, India, Iran, Jordan and Turkey. To date, we have distributed more than 21,000 tents, over 115,000 plastic sheets, close to 850,000 blankets, over 38,000 mattresses, and some 25,000 stoves/heaters in the quake zone.

At the height of the emergency operation, UNHCR had some 150 staff in Pakistan. We are grateful to the donor community for its contribution of nearly \$35 million to support this effort. As the UN's lead agency for camp management in the relief effort, UNHCR supported the government in the running of some 170 temporary relief camps for earthquake survivors in North West Frontier Province and Pakistan-administered Kashmir. We provided material and technical support to the authorities and coordinated with different UN agencies and NGOs to ensure basic services in the camps.

Since the start of spring in March, more than 140,088 quake survivors have left the camps for home and over 130 camps in the quake zone are now closed. Some 36,000 people remain in 44 relief camps.

In the months leading up to the handover, UNHCR upgraded and maintained services in the remaining camps. At the same time, we identified partners in the UN and NGO community to make sure basic services would continue in the camps.

From August until the end of this year, UNHCR and our partner, NRC, will second advisors to the UN Resident Coordinator's Office (UNRC) and provincial authorities

to capacitate the government by providing expertise on camp management for the remaining camp dwellers. One additional advisor has already been serving as a protection focal point for Pakistan-administered Kashmir under the UN Resident Coordinator structure since 1 August.

UK Service personnel recognised in latest Operational Honours and Awards List published on 8 September 2006

Members of HM Armed Forces have received honours and awards for services on operations for the period 1 October 2005 to 31 March 2006.



Flight Lieutenant Sohail Baqa Khan (RAF) deployed to Pakistan on Operation MATURIN has been awarded a Queen's Commendation for Valuable Service (QCVS recognises

meritorious service during, or in support of, operations) for his relief efforts in Pakistan, the country of his parents' birth, following the earthquake in Kashmir in October 2005 [Picture: RAF].

Commanding the forward element at the Pakistani Air Force Base Chaklala, Flight Lieutenant Khan was part of the RAF Odiham team led by 27 Squadron, which encompassed the specialist load handling skills of the Joint Helicopter Support Unit. The team's task was to support the movement of UN aid using three RAF Chinook heavy lift helicopters to the affected northern areas.

Along with his primary role of assisting with the coordination of aid tasking, Flight Lieutenant Khan's language skills allowed him to take on the role of the Liaison Officer with the Pakistani military. The RAF Odiham team made a significant contribution in moving much needed aid and the hard work and skills of the aircrew, engineers, support staff and the Joint Helicopter Support Unit drew praise from all areas concerned.

Flight Lieutenant Khan, said the experience had been challenging but the most rewarding of his career to date:

"I am deeply honoured to be awarded a Queen's Commendation for Valuable Service for my involvement in Operation MATURIN," he said. "I was one small part of the RAF Odiham Team of 27 Squadron, the Joint Helicopter Support Unit and the Joint Helicopter Force HQ that displayed the epitome of teamwork and professionalism in helping the people of Northern Pakistan after the devastating earthquake that shook the region. I feel it as an honour to be able to accept this award on behalf of the RAF Odiham Team."

High Commissioner

The British High Commissioner to Pakistan Sir Mark Lyall Grant KCMG is the representative in Pakistan of Her Majesty the Queen. He is responsible to the British Government for all aspects of the relationship between UK and Pakistan.

Chancery

Chancery are responsible for liaison between the government of Pakistan and the UK. They monitor the political situation in Pakistan and seek to encourage greater bi-lateral relationships between the two countries

Trade & Investment Section

UK Trade & Industry operations in Pakistan are based mainly in Karachi, the central hub of Pakistan's trade and economic markets. UKTI assist British companies that wish to invest or trade in Pakistan, as well as encouraging Pakistani companies to trade with the UK.

Visa Department

The Visa Section effectively regulates the entry to, and settlement in, the UK in the interests of sustainable growth and social inclusion. They do this by facilitating the entry of legitimate travellers while preventing the entry of those who do not qualify under the immigration rules.

Consular Department

Whether it's forced Marriage, British Nationals in distress, Passports or travel advice, the Consular team help British Citizens in Pakistan and provide assistance where they can.

Defence Department

is responsible for all aspects of the defence relationship between UK and Pakistan.

Management

is responsible for all Human Resources and financial resources and also provides support to front line departments

Press and Public Affairs Department

PAPAD is the Press and Public Affairs Department of the British High Commission. From press releases and interviews to Chevening scholarships and public diplomacy campaigns, PAPAD is the face of Britain in Pakistan.

British Council

is responsible for activities in education, English language, governance, science and the arts.

Department for International Development (DFID)

DFID-Pakistan, the Pakistan office of the Department for International Development, is based at the British High Commission. DFID's aim is to reduce poverty by helping achieve the Millennium Development Goals. In Pakistan, DFID does this by providing development assistance to reduce income poverty; improve health and education; and improve accountability of the state to its citizens. DFID supports a number of national programmes and also works in Punjab and NWFP.

BP awarded three Pakistan offshore blocks



On July, 21st 2006, BP announced that it had been awarded three offshore blocks in Pakistan's offshore Indus Delta. At a signing ceremony at the Ministry of Petroleum, the company said BP will explore blocks U, V and W covering an area of 21,000 sq km for oil and gas reserves, with the right to operate any commercially viable discoveries.

"The offshore Indus Delta is a very exciting prospect for us, with a geology that our experience tells us has a strong potential for containing hydrocarbons resources," explained Tariq Khamisani, President, BP Pakistan. BP said any natural gas finds will be used to meet growing demand in Pakistan, which enjoys a sizeable and growing domestic market and a comprehensive distribution infrastructure.

BP Pakistan is one of the largest foreign investors in Pakistan, currently producing 22 per cent of the country's oil and 6 per cent of its gas. The company operates the Badin and Mehran Concessions in a joint venture with Oil and Gas Development Company Limited, Occidental Petroleum (Pakistan) Inc., and Government Holdings Private Limited.

BP Pakistan (formerly known as Union Texas Pakistan) made its first oil and gas discovery at Khaskheli field, in the Badin concession area. Steve Peacock has taken over as President of its operations in the Middle East & Pakistan, replacing Dr. Michael Daly who returns to the United Kingdom to take on a senior role at the company's

To date BP Pakistan has discovered 61 oil and gas fields in Badin and Mehran concessions and has produced 355 mboe

The basic unit used to measure oil and gas production is barrels of oil equivalent, often abbreviated to boe. It is often necessary to use millions or billions of barrels of oil equivalent (mboe or bboe) when discussing oil reserves.

A boe (barrel of oil equivalent) is the amount of energy contained in a barrel of crude oil. Approximately 6,000 cubic feet of natural gas is considered equivalent to one barrel of oil, but the exact rate varies depending on the type of gas. This measure is used to quantify the output of an oil company in way which allows output of oil (measured in barrels) and gas (measured by its volume) to be added together to form one figure

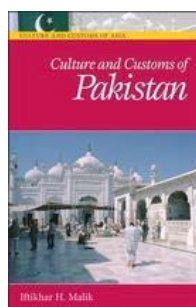

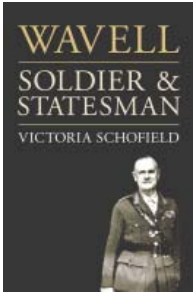

The coverage of culture and customs is contextualized throughout with the richness of the past and present Indus Valley civilization. Victoria Schofield has worked extensively as a journalist and broadcaster, specialising in South Asia. She has written a book on Wavell Soldier & Statesman. Wavell was one of Britain's great military leaders. With extraordinary resilience, he faced triumph and disaster in the Middle East, Africa and Asia. His renowned victory in the Western desert was matched by the ignominy of the surrender at Singapore and the evacuation from Burma. Wavell's appointment as Viceroy of India was even more challenging, as he began its arduous move to independence. Yet behind such distinction lay an enigmatic man, equally celebrated for his unexpected silences as for his prolific memory and love of poetry. Drawing upon unpublished letters and diaries, together with interviews with the last surviving generation who knew him, she reveals the hopes, fears and the difficulties Wavell faced. Appointed and yet chastised by

Winston Churchill, the failure of one of the most important relationships of WW2 is laid bare. Pakistan Earthquake Eyewitness Briefing 3

Reconstruction work undertaken by Oxfam GB and Islamic Relief
